Best tearoom Head to trendy Clifton and make a beeline for **Heartfelt** Vintage (heartfeltvintage.co.uk) for its pretty afternoon tea (vegan options available), with vintage clothes to browse, too. Simply heaven! Or try Pinkmans (pinkmans.co.uk), which can be found on imposing Park Street, for its sour-dough-nut experience.

Out and about ss Great

Britain (ssgreatbritain.org), the world's first luxury liner, and the Clifton Suspension Bridge (cliftonbridge.org.uk) are both iconic Brunel attractions not to be missed. If you like art, make a beeline for Spike Island (spikeisland.org.uk), Bristol Museum & Art Gallery (bristolmuseums. org.uk) and Royal West Of England Academy (rwa.org.uk). Yuup (yuup.co) has a list of experiences run by local experts, including baking with Great British Bake Off's Briony May Williams, butchery, ceramics, yoga and more.

And so to bed The newly revamped **Avon Gorge by Hotel du** Vin (hotelduvin.com) offers grown-up boutique style and has wonderful views of the Gorge or Clifton Village. Doubles from £84 a night, room only.

Best independent shops

Pinkmans is known for its sour-dough-nuts

Don't miss Milliners' Guild hat shop (millinersquild.co.uk) or Guild Gallery (bristolguildgallery.co.uk) for creative homeware and souvenirs. Gloucester Road is the longest road of independent shops in the UK, with vintage, pre-loved and homeware stores, including Preserve (preserve-foods.myshopify.com).
